How to Use this Book

This book was created by Music House teachers trained in Suzuki method, to help beginning ² violin students and parents understand and follow the Suzuki Approach.

What is the Suzuki Method?

"More than fifty years ago, Japanese violinist Shinichi Suzuki realized the implications of the fact that children the world over learn to speak their native language with ease. He began to apply the basic principles of language acquisition to the learning of music, and called his method *the mother-tongue approach*. The ideas of parent responsibility, loving encouragement, constant repetition, etc., are some of the special features of the Suzuki approach." - Suzuki Association of the Americas

The importance of listening

"Children learn words after hearing them spoken hundreds of times by others. Listening to music every day is important, especially listening to pieces in the Suzuki repertoire so the child knows them immediately" (SAA).

Learn new pieces by listening to the recording first, then try to figure the melody out by ear. The practice tips and games included in this book are for students and parents to work on together; the note names provided in this book are to be used to double check accuracy.

When will I move on to the next book?


Students typically take a year or more to master the skills detailed within this book. It all depends on your age and frequency of practice! Everyone learns differently :)




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Think of your fingers as a family at the pool

Middle and ring fingers hang farther over the stick of the bow




10 fun practice ideas

- 1. Roll a dice to decide which twinkle variation to practice!
- 2. Roll a dice to decide how many times to play Flower Song
- 3. Make flashcards and time how quickly you can get through them all!
- 4. Use your flashcards along with a board game; every time you play what's on the card, you roll the dice then move your game piece!
- 5. Concert: facetime a friend or family member, or put on a concert for your stuffed animals—wear a fun outfit, practice bowing and walking on/offstage.
- 6. Practice violin in different parts of the house and see which area sounds the best!
- 7. Once a song starts to feel easy, try playing it while standing on one leg or walking in a circle.
- 8. Teach a parent, friend, or sibling the 5 twinkle rhythms, then have them guess which is which!

- 10. Color in one part of a picture for each repetition

- 3. Bow soup could also do pizza, cookies, etc.




- 4. Put a penny in a jar for every good bow hold you make
- 5. Make 5 bow holds during each commercial break when watching TV
- 6. Itsy bitsy spider crawls
- 7. Bow olympics: 5 push ups, 5 windshield wipers, 5 pointer finger taps,5 pinky taps. Shake it out and repeat!
- 8. Find different objects throughout your house that you can use to make a bow hold! ex: pencil, straw, twig, toothbrush
- 9. Try using a violin bow hold to hold your toothbrush when you brush your teeth!
- 10. Teach a trusted friend or family member how to make a bow hold!

Notes on the A-string

a = open A string (no fingers down)

With each finger added to the string, we step up to the next highest note!

Keep your eyes on your violin to make sure your bow and fingers are in the correct spot!

Practice the first three notes TEN times, pausing before playing C# to place your second finger on the tape and roll your bow over to the A string

Find the scale in line 1, then circle it in RED

Find the arpeggio in line 2 and circle it in BLUE. Then play the end of line 2 TEN times

Practice line 3 TEN times. Count to 5 in your head for the repeated notes

Song of the Wind AKA "Froggy Pond"

Sing, then play "F33FE" TEN times! Remember: the first 3 is third finger A string (D), then we hop that third finger to E string for the next note (high A!)

Practice the first half of the song FIVE times

Sing, then play the second half of the song THREE times! Try to sing the words in your head while you play to keep track of the repeated notes




Play through line three FIVE times, making sure to have your third finger prepped and ready to go for a fast string change on "F#F EDC#"



Skills Check-In: Posture & Technique

Bow Arm: Relaxed bow hold; bow arm moves from the elbow in the upper-half



Violin Position/Left Hand: Violin supported by the head and shoulder; relaxed left hand, wrist, and thumb



Ear Training: Can identify same/different, higher/lower pitches; Can identify skips vs. steps; Can recognize patterns in music (scales, arpeggios); Listens to recordings every day!



Knows all the note names on A and E strings; left hand plays with tall round fingers and accurate finger placement; keeps fingernails trimmed***
